Your manuscript "Foot Self-Care Behavior and Its Predictor in Diabetic Patients in Indonesia" (RESN-D-19-01512) has been assessed by our reviewers. Based on these reports, and my own assessment as Editor, I am pleased to inform you that it is potentially acceptable for publication in BMC Research Notes, once you have carried out some essential revisions suggested by our reviewers.

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Reviewer reports:

Reviewer 1: "PEER REVIEWER ASSESSMENTS:

OBJECTIVE - Full research articles: is there a clear objective that addresses a testable research question(s) (brief or other article types: is there a clear objective)?

No - there are minor issues

DESIGN - Is the current approach (including controls and analysis protocols) appropriate for the objective?

No - there are minor issues

EXECUTION - Are the experiments and analyses performed with technical rigor to allow confidence in the results?

No - there are minor issues

STATISTICS - Is the use of statistics in the manuscript appropriate?

No - there are issues with the statistics in the study

INTERPRETATION - Is the current interpretation/discussion of the results reasonable and not overstated?

Yes - the author's interpretation is reasonable

OVERALL MANUSCRIPT POTENTIAL - Is the current version of this work technically sound? If not, can revisions be made to make the work technically sound?

Probably - with minor revisions

PEER REVIEWER COMMENTS:

GENERAL COMMENTS:

The topic is of interest. However, the argument for the study could be strengthened. The study is not well conceptualized; there is no justification (theoretical or empirical) for selecting the predictors. The analysis did not account for possible across-center differences, and should have included all hypothesized predictors in the regression model.

REQUESTED REVISIONS:

Title: should it say "predictors" (i.e. plural, since more than one was found)?

Abstract: The abstract may be structured into objectives, methods and results. So, please provide more information on the sampling procedure used and the instruments administered to measure the key variables. A stronger argument could be presented to support the need / importance of investigating predictors of foot self-care behaviors. The last sentence could be revised to indicate or exemplify how the results can inform the design of prevention strategies.

Introduction: On page 3, line 39 - for consistency with the literature and the abstract, should the term "strategies" used instead of "measures"? On page 3, line 51, the term "conducted" could be replaced with "designed and implemented" or "delivered".

Prior to noting the importance of investigating factors, the authors should introduce the role of foot self-care behavior in preventing diabetic foot ulcers and mention there is limited evidence on Indonesians' engagement in this behavior - these points would support the statement of the study's first objective. Also, it would be useful to synthesize the literature on possible predictors of the behavior; this would help justify the ones investigated in this study.

Methods: Please 1) avoid using the term "subjects" and replace it with "participants"; 2) indicate if participants provided consent and how; 3) clarify the target population and the rationale for sampling patients from the 22 primary health centers.

The total sample size is well justified; however, there is no indication if the number of patients to be recruited from the 22 centers was equal across centers or proportional to the patient volume at each center.

The eligibility criteria are vaguely defined and not well justified; there is no explanation of how the criteria were assessed

and ascertained. For example, why was peripheral neuropathy assessed? Is it an eligibility criterion? If yes, please explain the reasons and add it to the list of criteria.

Please, provide a rationale for measuring diabetes distress, depression, family support, and knowledge - are these possible predictors? If yes, on what basis (theory or empirical evidence) were they selected?

Note that it is no longer recommended to examine the bivariate correlation between the predictors and the outcome or dependent variable, prior to conducting the multivariate analysis.

Since participants were recruited from 22 centers, and these centers may differ on a range of factors including the population served, it may be useful to examine for such difference prior to lumping the total sample and running the multivariate analysis. If differences are found, then the clustering or center should be accounted for in the regression analysis.

Results: there is no need to re-state the numbers (mean, percentages) in the text since these are presented in Table 1. The same applies for other sections - to avoid redundancy. The authors may want to report the range of possible scores in the respective tables.

What is the reason for examining the relationship between demographic / clinical characteristics and foot self-care behavior? Also, the explanation of the associations is not quite clear: the statement "higher than those within subject" is confusing as the comparisons were done among subgroups within the population.

It is now recommended to put more emphasis on reporting the direction and magnitude of the associations than on statistical significance.

The inclusion of only the predictors that showed statistically significant bivariate correlation with the outcome in the regression analysis is no longer considered appropriate - all hypothesized predictors should be included in the regression, as the performance of a predictor can be influenced by the inclusion of others.

Discussion: It would be enlightening to suggest how these findings can inform the design of interventions, as stated in the introduction
